"We're Not Alone"

You may have noticed our newsletter's theme: "God With Us". This comes from the meaning of our congregational moniker, Immanuel, from which our newsletter takes its name. God with us is the essence of the Christian hope that we preach at Immanuel. It is the heart and soul of the Gospel. As God was made man in Christ, suffered on the cross for our sins and rose from the dead, He is with us as sin and death no longer separate us from Him. Our being with God will be forever in Christ.

Yes, God is with us. But Immanuel brings us into even further unity. God not only makes us one with Him but also makes us one with fellow believers. This is the fellowship we confess in the Apostles' Creed as the "communion of saints". Through a mutual faith in the sacrificial death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we are brought together as the one, holy, Christian and apostolic Church. In fact, we chiefly experience our unity with God as we do so together. It is when even two or three gather in God's name. This is the act of Christian worship. We uniquely experience it as Christ's Church when at the altar, God's table, we sacramentally eat with Him and one another. Meals are best experienced with family and friends.

Unity serves a further purpose. Christ has sent His Church out to the nations to share the Gospel. That's a lot of ground to cover. We can do this mission better together than we can all by ourselves. Scripture repeatedly talks of being a Christian in the context of "togetherness". Christ is the vine and we, the many branches, are grafted into Him bearing fruit. We are also together as the Body of Christ; He the Head and we the many varying parts serving according to our purpose. We are a holy nation, the new Israel, the people of God, to declare His marvelous deeds. Two things become clear in these images of the Church: 1) many parts are unified into one whole; 2) which is more effective when the many are working together for a common purpose.

Our nation has a theme, too. *E Pluribus Unum*. It is Latin for "one from many". It was coined by Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams for the first Great Seal of the United States in 1776 with the hopes of unifying many colonies, later states, into one nation. But it, too, speaks to a greater purpose of unity. We do better when we work together as a nation, when we seek the common good. We are in this together.

Unity says something about the nature of love that is present with us in Christ. Love is possible only as God is with us and it is best experienced together. When we help our neighbor, when we share in the responsibilities of our congregation, when we give rather than seek to receive—we are experiencing the love of God in Christ. And when we gather together in worship on the Lord's Day, we are receiving it unto eternal life.

Orphan Grain Train is a 501c3 Nonprofit Christian volunteer network that shares personal and material resources with needy people in America and around the world. Grain Train volunteers gather donations of clothing, medical supplies, food, Christian literature, and other aid to meet real needs. The Orphan Grain Train movement is a loving response to Jesus Christ's example as a servant and His love for us. More than 3,728 semi-trailer truckloads of food, clothing, medical supplies, and religious materials have been sent to 69 countries and several disaster areas in the U.S. since 1992. Earlier this year Immanuel participated in "Undie Sunday" gathering underwear and socks for adults and children. We donated over 100 items and Pastor Curley delivered them. Self Employed - Educational Materials sales - mom got me started 12 yrs Barnes and Noble 10 yrs


99 Cents only 5 yrs

Duties of Open Board Positions

FINANCIAL SECRETARY: The Financial Secretary shall receive and record in books kept for such purpose, and deposit in the congregation's designated depository, all congregational moneys, including offerings,

contributions, special collections, loans, subsidies, bequests, etc. A report of all receipts shall be submitted to the Finance Director each week, to the Board of Directors each month, and a written report to the Annual Congregational Meeting. He or she shall keep an accurate record of individual contributions and shall submit a quarterly statement of receipts to all members and shall annually issue a detailed report of their contributions to all members. Should members neglect their stewardship of money, according to his records, he or she shall report such action to the Chief Elder.

STEWARDSHIP DIRECTOR: The Stewardship Director shall be responsible for developing, implementing, and maintaining various programs stressing the importance of stewardship to the Congregation and utilize its resources and participation of their time, talents and other contributions and resources. The stewardship director will also encourage participation in outreach and other programs in conjunction with the Planning and Publicity Director and Evangelism Director. He or she shall make monthly reports to the Board of Directors on the status of the Congregation's stewardship program as well as progress toward meeting any established goals. Annually, at the Congregational meeting, he or she shall present a written report to the Congregation on the status of the Stewardship program.

EVANGELISM AND SERVICE DIRECTOR: The Evangelism and Service Director shall plan, promote, and carry out an evangelism program for the congregation. To this end he or she shall arrange for the maintenance of a "Prospect File", enlist aid in visiting prospective members, and assist the pastor in training evangelism callers. The Evangelism and Service Director will, in conjunction with the Stewardship and Planning Director, be responsible for outreach to community.

<u>EDUCATION DIRECTOR:</u> The Education Director shall foster spiritual growth in the life of every member. He or she shall plan, promote, and carry out programs in the areas of Bible study, family life, missions, etc. He or she shall supervise the entire Sunday School Program. He or she shall appoint the Superintendent, and other officers (such appointments shall be ratified by the Board of Directors). He or she shall obtain qualified teachers (also to be ratified by the Board of Directors). With the aid of the pastor and Sunday School officers, he or she shall develop a teacher-training and leadership education program adequate to the needs of the congregation. He or she shall bring to the attention of the Board of Directors the needs of facilities, equipment, and finances for all phases of the congregation's education program.

SOCIAL WELFARE DIRECTOR AND ELDER: The Social Welfare Director shall study the needs of individuals in the congregation. He shall further study the needs of the aged, of the sick, and of the poor. He shall bring these needs to the Board of Directors with recommendations for action. He shall report on the social needs of the community and solicit congregation cooperation with other agencies in the community endeavoring to meet these needs.

SYNODICAL RELATIONS DIRECTOR AND ELDER: The Synodical Relations Director and Elder shall serve as liaison between the congregation and the Circuit, the District, and the Synod. He shall seek to cultivate within the congregation a clear understanding of the relationship of the congregation and

our sister congregations of Synod. He shall be a congregational representative to the Circuit Council and shall do everything possible to keep the congregation informed of and involved in all pertinent matters regarding the Church-at-large. He shall serve as an Elder and member of the Board of Spiritual Life.
